Background Information on Victory Gardens

During World Wars I & II, vegetable, fruit and herb gardens were planted in private residences and public parks in Canada, the United States and United Kingdom to reduce the pressure on the public food supply that was brought on by the war effort. In addition to indirectly aiding the war effort, these gardens were also considered a morale booster as gardeners felt empowered by their contribution of labor and were rewarded by the produce grown. This made Victory Gardens a part of daily life on the home front.

Today, the desire to grow our own food is gaining in popularity for many different reasons. We are becoming more concerned about the environment and more and more people are aware of the need for a sustainable food culture. Community gardens are springing up all across Ontario and across the country. Modern Victory Gardens are growing as fast as the soil can be prepared. Vegetable plants are being combined with flowers. Where space is limited, vegetables can be grown in containers on porches, patios or balconies. Some plants can even be grown indoors on sunny window sills.

Gardening is good for the Soul. It is a wonderful way to reconnect with what is important in life. It is also better for the planet. And the greatest benefit of all is—IT TASTES SO GOOD!

We did not dress in Victorian costumes, though many folks did which added to the atmosphere of the event.

COMMUNITY CENTRE GARDENS


Again this year, volunteers from the Greely Gardeners Group have given several hours of their time to maintain the flower beds at the Greely Community Centre and the Greely Library. These volunteers know who they are and the Executive Committee would like to thank them for their help.

In early June our volunteers focussed their attention on the Library plantings. We cleaned out the dormant leaves of the *Miscanthus* grasses, pulled weeds from the

beds, pruned the *Spirea* shrubs near the Library entrance and spread additional mulch on most of the beds. With the number of the large *Miscanthus*, it did not take too long to fill six garden bags of recyclable material.

The main 'flagpole' garden came through the winter very well and we only lost one or two of the perennials planted last summer. Most of the plants were showing good growth and a promise of a good looking garden to reward our major redesign and planting efforts in 2012.

On the same visit, the small border surrounding the community centre sign on Meadow Drive was tidied up in preparation for the planting of annual flowers to replace the spring daffodils. A grouping of *Pelargoniums* was planted later in June.



In early July our volunteers returned to weed all of the beds and to replace the two *Echinacea* and the *Delosperma* that did not survive the winter. We also spread additional mulch around the beds near the Library entrance. This mulch was generously provided by our friends at Greely Sand and Gravel (www.greelysand.com).

If you have not seen the gardens around the Community Centre and Library, check them out. They may not be huge and overly diverse, but they are "ours" and we are very proud of the work of the Greely Gardeners Group volunteers.
